

Further Description of Important Features</p> <p>The front facade is composed of two square corner pavilions flanking a rectangular central section. The recessed central entrance on this facade is framed by an arcade supported by columns. Most of the fenestration is composed of banks of 6/6 windows. The east and west facades contain a slightly projecting central entrance with a gabled top. An open bell tower with a conical roof, set on a brick base, tops the center of the roof.</p> <p>43. History and Significance</p> <p>This structure replaced a private residence, which had served as the Catholic school since the property was purchased by the Archdiocese in 1909. It was an all-male school until it closed in 1966. The Corpus Christi Catholic Church of New Burlington, Ohio used it as a grade school from that same year until 1980. The building is significant architect- (over)</p> <p>44. Description of Environment and Outbuildings</p> <p>Parking areas surround the building on three sides. The Dayton-Campbell Historic District, composed of homes from the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries, is just east. A new senior citizen housing complex is on the southeast corner of Sixth and Dayton.</p> <p>45. 43. (continued) turally as a very good example of the Spanish Colonial Revival style in the city and as an example of the work of prominent local architects, Mueller and Hair. Based on accounts in the Hamilton Journal-News, it appears that this school was the first central Catholic high school in the United States. (See attached documentation.)

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Two separate interior views of the building. The first view shows the interior of the building, which appears to be a large, open space with a high ceiling and a central area. The second view shows a different part of the interior, possibly a hallway or a smaller room, with a similar architectural style.

The building was built in 1902 and was the first central Catholic high school in the United States. It was an all-gate school until 1911. The building is located on the southeast corner of Sixth and Dayton.

The building is a two-story structure with a prominent central tower. The architecture is a blend of Spanish Colonial Revival and Art Deco styles. The building is currently used as a school and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.
