

Further Description of Important Interior and Exterior Features (Continued on Reverse if Necessary) Built ca. 1875 on a fieldstone foundation, the Granary was designed to house ear corn, small feed grains and a steam powered grinder. It is a symmetrically arranged structure distinguished by twin driveways that extend east-west. The main gabled structure measures 47', 8 inches wide and 39' deep. The lower, single story stem of the 'T' attached to the east side of the corn crib rests on a rough ashlar limestone foundation and houses the granary. A portion of the granary also extends into the continued...						6. Specific Address or Location 3681 Hamilton-New London Road
43. History and Significance (Continue on Reverse if necessary) According to Henry Halstead Robinson 'The white granary and big red barn...were built by John M. Scott.' The granary appears in historic photos of the farmstead and would appear to be as old or possibly predate construction of the barn. The granary housed a steam powered grinder used to furnish grain to the cattle in the big barn.						
44. Description of Environment and Outbuildings (See #52) Located approximately 150' east of the Scott Barn. Part of the historic Halstead family farm that overlooks the picturesque Paddy's Run valley.

center read portion of the main building. The entire structure is covered in vertical board siding. Corn cribs located on the north and south gable end walls are 5' wide, flanking the interior wagon passages that measure 12', 6 inches. The structure is divided into seven bays with eight bents. Eight principle tie beams are both hewn and sawn, suggesting some framing members were salvaged from an older structure. Knee braces are a robust 6 inch x 6inch and upper floor joists extending east-to-west are mainly 2 inch x 6 inch members.
